Looking Back ~ Looking Forward

London Drama has had a very good year this year. As well as a full programme of evening courses we have run a total of seven day workshops through the year as well as developing a regular E-Newsletter.

We began with our regular event, the London Drama Students' Welcome on 27 September 2008 held at the Institute of Education with fifty students from PGCE Drama courses across London and including Reading.

Many of these students went on to participate in the other six events we organised: a drama workshop with Jonothan Neelands on 8 November 2008; a half day workshop with HoiPolloi on 11 March 2009; a Shakespeare workshop with the RSC (in partnership with Richmond Theatre) on Friday 27 March; Creating Drama with Animated Objects and Puppets with Oily Cart; a Masks workshop with Trestle on 15 May (see photos on pages 2-3); and the year has been very nicely rounded off with a physical theatre workshop with Complicite (see above photo).

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Looking forward to the coming year we have some exciting new developments. The main one is the development of our website, now well under way. With this people will be able to book and pay for their membership, courses and books online via Paypal and/ or credit card, the books being individually displayed on the site (at last).

We have also built in a special members' area for members'

discounts, news, discussion group, blog etc. as well as pages for different phases and for boroughs which our current site does not support.

Another exciting development is the initiation of a Primary Drama Champions Research programme in Croydon. Following its successful establishment in Southwark from 2006 on the project is now being introduced in neighbouring Croydon by an ex-Southwark Drama Champion now a Deputy Head in a Croydon Primary School. We look forward to supporting this initiative and have high hopes for a very successful project in the course of next year.

BRINGING the LONDON DRAMA MEMBERSHIP TOGETHER to share ideas and resources

RESOURCES

As reported in recent *Dialogues* Chris Lawrence has been active in developing member resources including the E-News, sending upto-date information on drama and theatre. We are also actively revamping the London Drama Website to facilitate member access and exchanges.

A development area that will utilise these resources, that we want to flag up, and, with your active involvement, progress in stages - is bringing you - the drama practitioner community into positive contact with each other.

DRAMA in ISOLATION. Drama and Theatre / Drama in Education have developed as a diverse range of creative practices. In the *Golden Age* boroughs had Drama Advisors who organised regular developmental meet-ups. However the Local Management of Schools separated schools from each other. Our contacts reveal many Drama teachers working in professional isolation.

The support system is long gone. Schools are self-managed, many with amazing outcomes - but working independently. Our aim is to bring you all, as drama practitioners, into closer contact.

First it will help a great deal to survey the field of drama practice.

• We also plan to promote existing resources. Southwark has developed a primary drama teacher training scheme. Redbridge maintains its Drama Centre. There are key Theatre Programmes across London we intend to develop further links with - Half Moon Theatre, Lyric Hammersmith, Richmond, Bubble Theatre - see our Theatre Member list.
